How does consideration of these broader issues make us better practitioners?

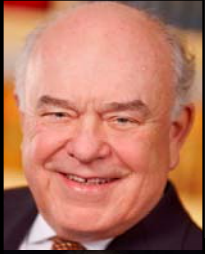

Thomas G. Bastedo, Q.C., Cert. F. Arb, Bastedo Stewart Smith

Tom has taught at the University of Toronto, Osgoode Hall Law School and Atkinson College, on a full time and part-time basis, and lectured extensively on the subjects of mediation, mediation/arbitration and arbitration in Ontario family law both nationally and internationally. He carries on an active family law practice and was the first Chair of the Family Law Specialty Certification Committee for the Province of Ontario, has received the 2004 Kroll Linquist Avey *Award For Excellence in Family Law* given by the Ontario Bar Association. He has written numerous articles in the field of family law and in the legal and practical aspects of mediation and arbitration in this province.



Roger Beaudry, C.Med, C.Arb, Aptus Conflict Solutions

Roger is one of the most recognized and successful Francophone mediators in Ontario. He has mediated everything from simple one issue two party disputes to complex multiparty, multi-issue, multi-cultural disputes.
